Thy Kingdom Come



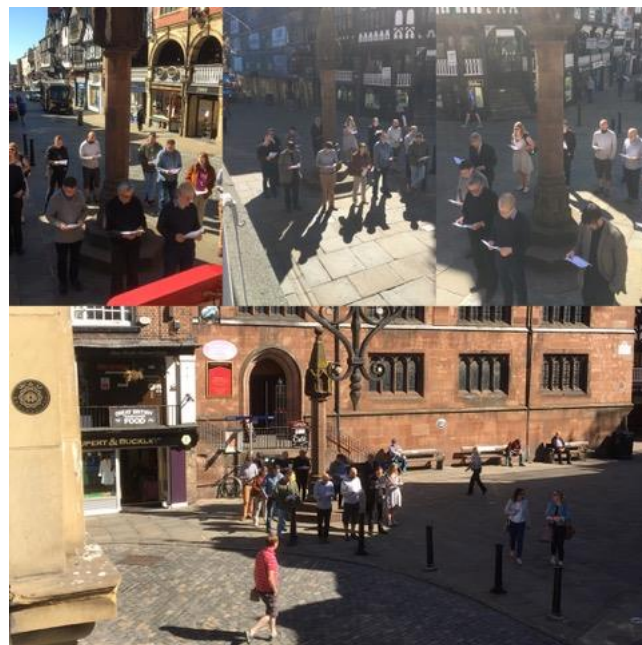
Thy Kingdom Come, a prayer initiative for evangelisation, was held between Ascension and Pentecost, 10th May to 20th May 2018.

This was its third year and it continues to

grow, especially in its ecumenical reach of different churches and denominations involved. Resources were available from the 'Thy Kingdom Come' website and liturgies, prayer suggestions and study materials drawn from a wide range of Church traditions were available.

Across Cheshire a large number of activities and events were organised, of which the following are but a sample.

In Chester a full programme of prayer was organised for each day, including a daily prayer walk of the City walls. Church leaders in Chester came together at The Cross to pray for the City.



Halton Trinity Methodist Church in Runcorn held an afternoon of prayer, offering a variety of interactive prayer stations.

Around Wrenbury the Parish Church and the local Methodist Churches held a series of prayer and worship opportunities, including two prayer walks in the local villages.

Bishop Libby Lane and Archdeacon Ian Bishop held prayer walks in each of the Deaneries in the Archdeaconry.

A Beacon Event was held at Chester Cathedral on the evening of Pentecost. Worship was led by Lou Fellingham, a testimony was given by Warren Furman star of TV's Gladiators, the Calvary Love City Gospel Choir sang, and over 100 young people from House of Dance concluded the service.

Next year 'Thy Kingdom Come' will again be celebrated from 30th May to 9th June.

An interactive day exploring different ways and experiences of raising funds for church projects, and how the activity of raising funds can be a great tool for mission in itself. The day will include grants, public appeals, events, donors and in-kind help and collaborations.

Cheshire Constabulary, Cinnamon Network and the local church

Cinnamon Network and the county's police and crime commissioner have launched a new partnership at The Salt Works in Northwich.

More than 70 church representatives, local authority, police and other agencies came together to see how stronger links could be developed and to make the most of opportunities to connect and work together to support the people of Cheshire .



David Keane, Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for Cheshire has agreed to fund 10 micro-grants through Cinnamon Network to help local churches across the county kick start social action projects in their area.

A high proportion of calls coming to the police nationally are “non-crime” related. This is mirrored across the county and has led to the partnership with Cheshire's police and crime commissioner and Cheshire Constabulary to give the most appropriate support to vulnerable people.

PCC David Keane said: “I am delighted to be working in partnership with Cinnamon Network to support vulnerable people within the community. This new partnership aims to not only to ease the strain on the police service, but also to provide a more effective support to those in need.

“Our faith communities are vital to helping us better protect the most vulnerable in society. Funding these projects gives us the opportunity to further enhance the role of our faith community, enabling us to spread the best practice across the county”

“The micro-grants will help establish a vast array of projects to tackle key issues faced by communities across the county, whilst supporting residents of any faith or no faith at all.”

Alison Linfield, Police Partnership Manager for Cinnamon said: "This is a great opportunity to support locally based faith groups and to work with Cheshire Constabulary. I am excited about the good work that can be started by these new micro-grants and the broader support available. I look forward to hearing about

the projects they instigate and the people whose lives they transform”

Churches can apply for a micro-grant to help them start one of over 30 tried and tested “off the shelf” community based Cinnamon Recognised Projects (CRP). These support four areas of community need.

- creating safe places for children and young people
- supporting safer, stronger families
- building safer, stronger communities
- fighting poverty

10 micro-grants of up to £2,000 are now available; applications will need to be match funded by any church which can be through in-kind contribution as well as cash.

Bible reading raises thousands for Christian aid

Churches and schools from Chester and surrounding villages took part in 'The Bible in a Day' event at Chester Cathedral, raising £6,553.07 for the work of Christian Aid.

Teams of volunteers from each church and school prepared a section of Canon Trevor Dennis's book, *The Book of Books* to be read in the Cathedral Refectory. In 2003, when he was Vice Dean at Chester Cathedral, Trevor wrote *The Book of Books: The Bible Retold*, described at the time as 'A deceptively simple and brilliantly imaginative retelling of the stories that make up the Bible.' It was subsequently translated into five other languages.

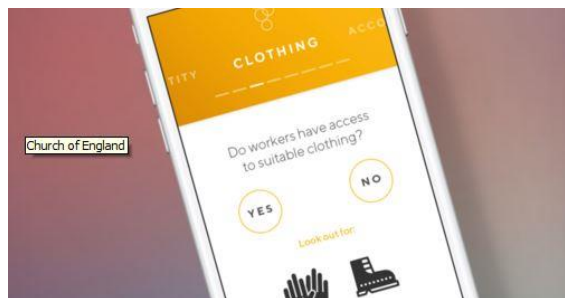
With help at the start from members of the Christian Aid Group and the Cathedral congregation, and Elisabeth Forster, the wife of the Bishop of Chester, pupils from sixteen schools and members of eighteen churches read right through *The Book of Books*, from Genesis to Revelation, beginning at 8.00am and finishing at 8.45pm.

John Griffith, a Christian Aid Teacher says, 'Having visited the schools to talk about the work of Christian Aid before the event, I thought it was great to see them engaging with the stories with such enthusiasm.' Each of the schools and churches made a commitment to raise funds for Christian Aid, and with coffee mornings to Noah's Ark dress-up days they really got into the fundraising.

Canon Trevor Dennis says, 'We were all engaged together in a great task, to convey the spirit, the energy, the humour, pathos, excitement and challenge of some of the finest storytelling and poetry the Bible has to offer, and to raise funds, so desperately needed in this troubled world, for Christian Aid. The day itself was a very moving experience, and the pupils and church members raised more than any of us expected. Thank you so much to all who made it happen.'

Churches to help stop car wash modern slavery with app

Anti-slavery charities suspect many victims to be in car wash businesses and support the churches' app.

The National Crime Agency thinks there are tens of thousands of people being exploited in the UK, forced to work long hours, for little or no pay, and under threat of violence. They suspect many of them are working in terrible conditions in car washes as police have unearthed this kind of exploitation in garages throughout the country.

To combat the problem, drivers are being encouraged to join a national information-gathering campaign launched by the Church of England? and the Catholic Church in an app.

The Safe Car Wash app will allow drivers to log where they are washing their car and answer a series of questions which could help identify if the staff have been trafficked.

This could vary from saying whether the workers have suitable protective clothing to any personal indicators such as staff seeming withdrawn.

County Chaplain, St John Ambulance Cheshire.

St. John's Ambulance, Cheshire would like to appoint a County Chaplain and possibly a deputy who could help give chaplaincy cover across the volunteer units of the County. They will succeed Revd Alan Jewell (St Matthew's, Stretton) who has resigned due to increased demands on his time from his parish. The Chaplain will attend the four County Priory Group meetings annually, held at Winsford. The annual Carol service is hosted by the local units in turn. Apart from these commitments it is really up to the individual to make as much of the role as he or she wishes. There is a meeting of North West County Chaplains held annually at Blackburn Cathedral under the wing of Rev Crispin Pailing of St Nicholas, Liverpool

Appointment of new General Secretary to Churches Together in England

The Board of Churches Together in England are pleased to announce the appointment of the Revd Dr Paul Goodliff as the new General Secretary of CTE. He will succeed Revd. Dr. David Cornick, who retires in September. In the time David has been General Secretary he has seen a significant growth in the number of churches, now 46, who are members of CTE.



Paul Goodliffe is a Baptist minister and theologian. As you will all know, Paul comes to the post at a time of transition in the light of the Theos report as CTE re-focuses on mission. He says:

‘At a time of renewed commitment to the ecumenical process, with a more missional focus to the work as *Churches Together in England*, I am looking forward immensely to participating in this new chapter of the ecumenical life in England. It is a privilege to be able to offer some leadership to this process, as together CTE serves the churches of this land. I hope to prayerfully encourage the whole church of Jesus Christ to ‘move in the Spirit as we are called to transformative discipleship’, to echo the theme of the very recent WCC *Commission for World Mission and Evangelism Conference* held in Arusha, Tanzania, and which I attended as a delegate. As the ecumenical movement in England embraces the mission of God to make Christ known in word and deed, I am certain we will discover more of what that that transformative discipleship means together

than when we do so alone, always trusting in the gracious enabling of the Holy Spirit.’
