Week of Prayer for Christian Unity


The Churches Together in Cheshire service for the Week of Prayer was held on 21st January at Chester Cathedral, when the preacher was the Archbishop of York, the Rt. Revd. Dr. John Sentamu.

That the Churches of the Caribbean had prepared the material for the Week of Prayer was marked by the contributions both of a steel band, who played before and during the service and of the West Indian leaders of the New Testament Church of God in Crewe, Pastor David Edwards, Dr. Linda Edwards and Mr Dalton Haughton, who read the lessons and introduced the hymn 'Amazing Grace'.

Rogationtide Celebration of Rural Life in Cheshire

There is to be a celebration of rural life and the economy of rural areas at **Chester Cathedral on Sunday 29 April at 3.00 pm.**

The preacher will be Bishop Libby Lane and people and organisations representing the rural life of the county and the diocese will be taking part.

All are welcome.



Thy Kingdom Come is a prayer initiative led by the Church of England for evangelisation. It will be held between Ascension and Pentecost, which is Thursday 10th May to Sunday 20th May 2018.

2018 is the third year in which it has been held and it continues to grow, especially in its ecumenical reach of different churches and denominations involved. In particular both the Methodist and Roman Catholic

churches have a more formal part to play with some of their own dedicated resources and videos being produced for their national networks. Many other member churches of Churches Together in England have a national 'Champion' who has been appointed to facilitate communication, advice, resources and networking within their denomination along the lines of the advice from the Archbishop of Canterbury 'pray in your own way'.

The theme and logo *Thy Kingdom Come* is now established in many parts of the world as world networks of churches and denominations in nearly 60 countries are praying at the same time, using the Lord's Prayer with the intention of evangelisation. Resources are being produced in many different languages.

A key theme for individual Christians who #pledgetoprayer (Twitter thread) is 'Pray for Five'. Christians are praying for five people they know that at least one might become a follower of Jesus. *Thy Kingdom Come* is not prescriptive as to how that might happen and individual churches and groups of churches are encouraged to pray for their own ways of outreach.

A New Framework for Local Unity in Mission

Last year an 'exciting, significant, practical, ecumenical document' came to fruition. *A New Framework for Local Unity in Mission* was published after extensive consultation. This major piece of work marks a change in the understanding of unity work at local level.

The document was approved by Churches Together in England's Enabling Group which asked for further work to be done. The initial stage of this work has now been completed and *A guide to understanding 'A New Framework for Local Unity in Mission'* has now been published.

The guide stresses that *A New Framework* is a process, a shift in thinking. It liberates possibilities, allowing creativity, self-expression and joyful fulfilment. Properly understood, it is a springboard for innovation and creativity, beginning with what is needed in a situation and encouraging light-touch, yet prudent and appropriate structures.

The *Guide to Understanding* makes explicit what has often been implicit, recognising the missional imperative of unity work at local level: "...deeply rooted in Christian tradition is the idea that we are judged by our fruits: 'If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit.' Mission is the fruit of unity and unity the fruit of mission."

Jacob's Ladder



The Jacob's Ladder group originated from a successful public workshop, held in February 2017 at Chester Cathedral, which explored how members of the local community might provide a welcoming response to families who have fled conflict in Syria and resettles in Cheshire West and Chester as part of the UNHCR programme.


The group promotes awareness of the refugee situation and a positive narrative to counter that frequently prevalent in the media. Many of the families have a Muslim faith and the group seeks links with the Muslim community to foster good local relationships.

The group has

- Hosted the 'I welcome' photo exhibition of 30 evocative panels telling the big story of the global refugee crisis
- Worked with Chester cathedral towards becoming a Cathedral of Sanctuary

- Supported workshops focussing on refugees
- Contributed to activities during Refugee Week in June
- Raised awareness of the refugee situation within the local community.

Pause for Hope



The annual Pause for Hope service will this year be held in Chester Cathedral on Sunday, 3rd June at 3.00 pm. As usual the service will seek:

- To pray that the day will quickly come when all cancers can be prevented or cured
- to bring together in prayer those affected by all forms of cancer, their loved ones, carers and all involved in providing treatment and support.
- to remember dear ones lost to cancer
- to pray for those with responsibility for providing and allocating resources required in the investigation, treatment and care of patients with cancer
- to help those affected to understand the Christian value of suffering and

that the prayers of the sick and those who look after them have great power with God

- to help those who don't have cancer but have a great fear of the disease
- to reach out to those who are at home or in hospital as patients or carers and unable to attend the Pause for Hope services.

At the service members of all religious dominations and faiths are welcome as well as those with little or no religious faith.
