Salt of the Earth

The theme for the 2016 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which runs from $18^{th} - 25^{th}$ January, has been chosen by the churches of Latvia and is:

'Called to proclaim the mighty acts of the Lord' (1 Peter 2.9)

The service arranged by Churches Together in Cheshire will be held in Chester Cathedral on 24th January, 2016 at 4.00 pm when the preacher will be the Revd. Lord Leslie Griffiths. The gospel passage chosen by our Latvian sisters and brothers for this service is Matthew 5: 1-16, which includes the call to be salt and light. The salt theme is, of course, particularly appropriate to Cheshire, and it is planned that this should be marked.

New Year... New Challenge.....

Are you ready for a new challenge in 2016? Would you like to use your skills to help those living in extreme poverty? Are you passionate about justice? Do you want to inspire others to join the fight against extreme poverty? Christian Aid are looking to build their team of volunteer speakers and teachers across Cheshire.

As a volunteer teacher, you will inspire the next generation to build and grow a movement for justice and help young people understand the causes of poverty. Your role as a teacher would include establishing links with local schools and sharing stories about the work of our partner organisations in primary and secondary schools and sixth form centres. You may take assemblies and lessons or run workshops as part of themed days. You will need to have experience of working with children in a classroom environment, confidence within a school setting and be committed to the work of Christian Aid. If you could commit to around 3 school visits at term, this could be the role for you.

As a volunteer speaker you will be both passionate about eradicating poverty and comfortable speaking in a church environment. Your role as a speaker would include establishing links with local churches and sharing stories about the work of our partner organisations with churches and other groups. Your speaking will inspire people to give, take action and

pray for our work. You will need to have experience of public speaking, confidence within a church setting and be committed to the work of Christian Aid. If you could commit to at least 3 speaking engagements a year, this could be the role for you.

Both roles will be supported by a full time member of staff and an extensive selection of resources and training material. Out of pocket expenses are paid.

Churches Together in England

"CHURCHES LISTENING TOGETHER"

Representatives of Churches Together in Cheshire attended the CTE triennial Forum at Swannick at the end of September. The Forum, not a deliberative meeting, more a gathering of those engaged in the ecumenical journey, with its purposes deliberately loosely defined, placed stress on listening to voices not usually heard - the theme encouraged, if not imposed, by the growth of Churches Together in England from being a body of 16 members to one of 43. All needed to be acquainted with each another.

Therefore, representatives from the main groupings within CTE set out what they valued within their particular traditions (a challenge for some whose group, like the Free churches group, embraced a wide range of traditions) and others from across a wide geographical spectrum reflected on aspects of the ecumenical journey. In this, as at various points, the Forum was prompted to be mindful of Pope Francis' observation that 'unity is achieved whilst walking'.

The second day supplied the main meat of the Forum, with sessions on engaging with the Orthodox Churches, in whose tradition the morning prayers had been held, and with the Pentecostal churches. These sessions were widely appreciated. The afternoon session had been flagged as 'an opportunity to engage with CTE's Presidents' who, either in person or by prerecorded video links, responded to questions submitted by attendees in advance of the Forum and notified to them. They were challenging questions, such as:

- where do you experience unity?
- is eucharistic sharing part of your vision, and what would you do to achieve it?
- what should be the prophetic voice of the church in terms of refugees, asylum seekers, warfare?
- should we be seeking full visible unity or should we be acknowledging our diversity? In relation to that last question Cardinal Vincent Nicholl, who was present at the Forum, argued that diversity was not the opposite or enemy of unity, but a gift of the Holy Spirit.

For many the highlight of the Forum was the evening presentation from 12 young adult Christians from a wide spectrum of church backgrounds who had been brought together to attend the Chemin Neuf event 'Welcome to Paradise' in France. From very strong denominational allegiances, all reported very positive awakenings of ecumenical awareness and of powerful personal spiritual development, and each fluently articulated their excitement in relations to the faith journey they had undertaken.

In the final plenary David Cornick gave a very lucid theological reflection, arguing for a new paradigm for ecumenism, a more critical ecumenism following an iterative and not a linear path to unity. On the CTE website it possible to read the accumulated feedback comments. One gave a significant insight into the impact of the event:

Ecumenism reminds us to look beyond the conventions that our own individual churches create due to the fact that we are only human, and it calls us to look to what we all endeavour to hold but of course can never manage; the mystery of Christ and his call to serve. The act of dialoguing and the practice of ecumenism is essential in order to develop in our theologies and our understandings of God.



New Spaces, Old Mindsets?

Conference on partnership working between local authorities and faith groups.

University of Chester 4th November 2015

Delegates from eight local authority areas across the north of England came together at the University of Chester's Riverside Innovation Centre to discuss partnership working between faith groups, local communities and local authorities. The conference, entitled New Spaces, Old Mindsets? Meeting the Challenge of Creating Hopeful and Flourishing Communities in an Era of Austerity, was designed to engage with senior personnel from public and faith sectors. Participants came together to discuss the new policy landscape that has emerged out of the 2008 financial crash and which has been shaped by policy frameworks of both localism and austerity.

The day was organised by the University of Chester's Centre for Faiths and Public Policy, Cheshire West and Chester Council, and Link Up, which is a relational network of churches and church leaders in and around Chester, West Cheshire and the wider region.

Senior representatives from Cheshire West and Chester, Stoke on Trent, Doncaster, Durham, Blackpool, St Helens and Trafford attended, along with partners from their respective faith sectors, to discuss the challenges and obstacles that now exist towards providing goods and services, and how to enable flourishing and resilient local communities and neighbourhoods. The conference reflected on examples of good practice, analysing case studies from some of the authorities participating, and speculated on whether these examples could offer broader templates for effective future governance.

'It's me, Jesus'

David Aston, Parish Administrator at Congleton writes:

"Over 5 years ago I woke at around 4am one Sunday morning with the distinct impression, "Write a book with Jesus in the first person." This was rather unexpected, but I accepted it as being from God (no other explanation, for many reasons!), and finding myself between working at the Message Trust and - as it later turned out - here, set about what I believed God had told me to do, firstly alongside other things, then for 6 months solid over the winter.

The result, "It's Me: Jesus", was published in March this year by Onwards & Upwards,

who took it on last summer. After a local launch and interview on UCB Radio, plus a talk at my parents' church where I grew up, it would be good now to find a wider audience than my own parish. The book is the four Gospels in one narrative, with Jesus telling the story. It can (should) be read as a novel, but there are also footnotes and more detailed notes at the back that readers may follow up as they wish. Several people have told me they read the book through first, then went back with their Bible and the notes.

I am hoping that the book will offer Christian readers a deeper background to the Gospel story, but also give others who might not read a Bible a chance to meet Jesus for the first time."
