A VIRTUAL PRAYER MEETING FOR REMEMBRANCE DAY

We gather today as God's people, physically apart but together in spirit, to remember, to give thanks and to pray. We will remember the millions of men and women from every background and walk of life whose service and sacrifice through past conflicts have secured peace and freedom. At 11 am we will observe the customary 2 minutes' silence.

This is a solemn day when we recall the horror of war and conflict and the pain and anguish that they cause. But it is also a time for us to acknowledge that there is hope, for God made this world, loves this world, cradles it in loving hands, enters its suffering and feels its pain. We draw strength and courage from the reminder that God has a plan for our world's renewal. At the end of this present age, he will overcome evil and there will be an end to sin, sorrow, pain and death. Heaven and earth will come together as one and there will be a new age of peace, joy, justice and love. In this year's unique context, we are also mindful of the service and sacrifice of so many in protecting our world from Covid-19. We reflect on the similarities in feelings, emotions and experiences of past events with those of today:

- the sense of being part of something affecting the whole world, over which we have no control and which results in huge cost
- + the separation from loved ones
- + the feeling of facing something unknown and unimaginable
- + the uncertainty of what the future will hold
- + the spirit of sacrifice for the common good
- + the desire to come together to support each other
- + the acknowledgement that we are all in this together.

Declaring our faith We begin by acknowledging our faith and trust in our faithful, loving God. Sing or read the words of this favourite hymn:

Responding in prayer

We acknowledge before you the ongoing presence in our world today

of forces of evil and oppression,

of those who resort to killing and destruction to fight for their cause

of peoples living in fear and deprivation due to conflict and aggression,

of those who are persecuted for standing up for freedom and justice,

and those who suffer the consequences of hatred and aggression.

We thank you for the measure of peace in which we live today; may we value it and nurture it recognising the price at which it was won.

We pray for the day to come when there will be no more war, when all people and nations of the world will live together in harmony, and you will rule over all.

As we remember the sacrifices of the past, help us also remember your ways of peace, that we too might work for peace and reconciliation in our families, our communities and our world.

Pray the Lord's Prayer in anticipation and longing for God's kingdom of love, peace, freedom and justice to come.

Remembering with gratitude

As we approach 11am,

we remember with pride and appreciation those who have given their lives in service of others; we remember with dismay the suffering, destruction and pain caused by human conflict; we remember with gratitude those whose lives we have had the privilege to share; we remember with sadness those whose death has caused us loneliness and pain.

We remember, not to glorify or celebrate war and conflict, but to recognise its cost and commit ourselves to be peacemakers and peacekeepers wherever that opportunity arises. Whatever our view, and whatever part we may have had to play in the theatre of war and conflict, we express our common humanity in recognising the value and worth of every life lost and that to be human is to be both marred by our common failings yet fashioned in the image of our Creator. And in our remembrance we ask God to help us learn from the mistakes of the past and to treasure every experience which points us to the building of love and friendship, peace and harmony.

So now in silence, let us recall before God all those who have given their lives in the cause of freedom and in the service of others;

They shall not grow old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.

Two minutes' silence.

In the rising of the sun and its going down We will remember them.

In the blowing of the wind and in the chill of winter, We will remember them.

In the blueness of the sky and in the warmth of summer, We will remember them.

In the rustling of the leaves and in the beauty of autumn, We will remember them.

When we are lost and sick at heart, We will remember them.

When we have joys we yearn to share, We will remember them.

So long as we live They too shall live, for We will remember them.

- † for all who are anxious and fearful.

Mention by name all those for whom you are especially concerned today.

Loving God, we commit into your care all who are in need today. Help us to lift our eyes above the torment of this broken world, and grant us the grace to pray for those who wish us harm. As we honour the past, may we put our faith in your future; for you are the source of life and hope, now and for ever.
